**Paths to Construction Procurement Reform and Intelligent Commissioning**

**I. Context**

This practice-led research is positioned within a context where there are endeavours afoot to achieve improvements in architectural and environmental quality through developing forward strategy and thinking on construction procurement reform, its implementation and practice, so that improved efficiencies and access can deliver better buildings.

This need for procurement reform has been universally identified and is tacitly acknowledged by the EU Commission in their current proposals to reforms the EU Procurement Directive 2004/18, the conjunctive reforms proposed by the UK Government through the Governments Construction Strategy, which call for cost savings of 20% in UK construction, the UK Governments Efficiency and Reform Group, the Lean Procurement Task Group, Cabinet Office SME panel, the RIBA Publication EU Green Paper on the Modernisation of EU public procurement policy Towards a more efficient European Procurement Market – Response paper 7 March 2011; RIBA ‘Building Ladders of Opportunity, How reforming construction procurement can drive growth in the UK economy’, May 2012; the RIBA ‘Strategy 2012-2016’, May 2012. These works are positioned alongside many others in the UK and EU who have identified the need for reform and consider it of utmost significant for economic and construction industry regeneration.

This research builds on the work already done and commenced in 2010, in my capacity as author of the EU Green Paper Response and as Chair of the RIBA Procurement Reform Group. It addresses the quality of outputs in both the private and public sectors of the 10% of the UK GDP which relates to construction and architecture. The purpose of this stage of the research is to

- develop strategic guidance for the diversity of procurement methods being sought by the various papers referenced above
- formulating approaches that can facilitate the outputs sought through exploration of the issues arising in the legislative programme for reform
- Developing comparative analysis and a research base for use by others.

**II. Competence and Track Record**

I am a practicing architect; director of Walter Menteth Ltd.; Senior Lecturer (part time) at the University of Portsmouth; Author of the RIBA response paper ‘EU Green Paper on the Modernisation of EU public procurement policy Towards a more efficient European Procurement Market – Response paper 7 March 2011; the Chair of the RIBA Procurement Reform Group; Member of the Cabinet Office SME Panel; an RIBA London Regional Councillor; external examiner at the University of Nottingham School of Architecture; member of the Southwark Design Review Panel; a Trustee of two

charitable organisations and director of a community property company.

The work of my practice has been shortlisted for the Mies van de Rohe prize for European architecture, has won a number of UK awards and been published and exhibited extensively both here and abroad.

My research interests in the theory and practice of architecture are focused on the space, boundaries and cross-overs between solidity, rigidity, changeability and on the processes which form them, both physically and metaphorically. Constructional versatility, meaning the ability of designs to have significant purposes beyond the simple resolution of the dynamic forces or the creation of spatial configurations, has been manifest in a variety of the practices works. These have aimed towards prototypical research, whether through the introduction of new construction techniques (such as gabion – Gwynne Road 2000;; vegetated walls and spoil recycling – High Cross Road 2004; fabric recycling – Bloomfield Road 2002) or in spatial configurations (Consort Road 2007).

Such resolution has an equivalent in the proportion and discourse between the solidity of walls, apertures and openings such as the windows which may exist within them. These are among the relationships between solidity, rigidity and changeability that are addressed in the transcript paper I gave to the RIBA Housing Symposium Jarvis Hall Sept. '08.

I have researched, prepared illustrative material, investigated and reported the accompanying Case Studies and drafted much of the RIBA Procurement report 'Building Ladders of Opportunity', its Case Studies and contextual analysis, whilst co-ordinating this effort across the RIBA and wider industry. I am I believe one of the most knowledgeable architectural practitioners in the field of construction procurement and have the necessary skills, experience, background and expertise, along with architectural, cross industry, legal, Government and political contacts necessary to draw forth a valid and valuable academic synthesis within this particular field of study.

### III. Research Questions

The purpose of the research will be to develop upon the strategic themes identified in the various Procurement publications I have lead on to date covering:-

- Practice, guidance and procedures on 'Intelligent Commissioning', meaning the methods used to scope, commission and evaluate architectural commissions. This will cover diversification with emphasis on embedding the competition process in the mainstream of procurement practice and increasing use of negotiated procedures.
- 'Proportionality' ensuring the requirements sought are realistically proportional to the specifics of a project and commission, with specific emphasis on addressing the culture of construction risk. The work shall be endeavouring to evaluate the issues associated with the project ring fencing that is currently applied and seeking to enumerate the relations between this and a wider societal evaluation of such risk, which accounts for all social and economic factors as an alternative proposition.
- Outcome based approaches to commissioning construction. Develop forward thinking on approaches which enhance commissioning evaluations on an outcome basis rather than process basis.

The study will aim to chart and demonstrate simple valid guidance and methods that can be applied in both public and private sectors, and for different commissioning authorities and procurement practices such as individual commissions and frameworks. The study will explore industry efficiencies and preparedness for change and options for implementation of reforms as they emerge with greater clarity.

### IV. Originality and Significance

I believe the work as proposed is original, is not being undertaken by others, individually or by any institutions and is of considerable significance to the future of the construction industry as it will direct the methods, accessibility, efficiency, and quality by which construction works, particularly public sector works are commissioned in the near future. It is of direct relevance to architects and the construction industry.

### V. Research design and method

This study will take further evidence by way of interviews and source papers on proposals and practice in the EU and UK which might be considered for adoption. Propositions will be evaluated in the context of emerging UK legislation and practice and iterative draft propositions formulated for discussion and circulation and developed in consultation with the various contacts to whom the outputs will be circulated. An analysis of various stages and conditions that might be applied will be tested against hypothetical commissioning scenarios and scales of commission with propositions modified accordingly.

I have commenced collating an evidential base of related UK and EU practice, papers, policy, statistical research and legislation across the subject of procurement. This extends across 11 subject sub headings with 461 individual files in 59 folders. This will be made publically available on line upon completion of the study as a research base for use by others.

<p><b>VI. Collaboration with others</b></p> <p>The work will be undertaken in discursive consultative collaboration with my contacts across the construction industry, the existing members of the RIBA Procurement Reform Group, other RIBA Committees and RIBA Council and colleagues at the University of Portsmouth. It is not proposed however to have any formal named collaborators on this core element of the necessary academic research and synthesis unless significant contributors to the research emerge.</p> <p>The committee structures and stakeholder contacts are largely defined but anticipated to extend as maybe necessary. The work to be published individually by myself may subsequently be absorbed into the reports of others, although I will retain copyright of the originating work which will be available with the research output.</p> <p><b>VII. Beneficiaries and publication</b></p> <p>The output is expected to be in the form of a series of papers, circulars and research findings published at various stages of the procurement reform process which will be collated at the end of the research stage. It is anticipated that these various outputs will be embodied in whole or part within papers circulated by the RIBA. Dissemination will also occur through various professional assemblies and at conferences as it has done over the past eighteen months.</p> <p>By working to ensure more cost effective and efficient procurement practice that can deliver improved quality and sustainability in its outputs, the beneficiaries of the work will include the architectural profession, the wider construction and society.</p> <p><b>VIII. Planning, Programming and Resources</b></p> <p>To date from 2010 research funding for this work has been entirely contributed by the company I am the director of. The quantum of this funding is no longer and hence this application will in part supplement this resource. Time estimates made within this application are based on time that has arisen to date @ approx 38 w/ends over the past year plus evening meetings (plus some).</p> <p>The research work is anticipated to extend over a one year programme working forward in 2 primary stages as follows.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Stage 1 for UK and Architects Council of Europe tabled work will engage with scripting and petitioning amendments over the course of the negotiations with the EU commission and UK Government in detail prior to the EU Commission adoption of the agreed amendments to the Proposed Procurement Directive (December 2012) followed by</li> <li>• Stage 2 the assessment of the finally agreed transcripts and the implications for the legislation transposing the new directive into national law.</li> <li>• Conjunctively with Stages 1 &amp; 2 the format for the 'Intelligent Commission', reformed application of the proportionality principle, and development of the outcome based approaches to assessment will be developed.</li> </ul>


